- If enrolment for any workshop is insufficient, Child Care Options may cancel or reschedule the class. In the case of cancellation, payment will be reimbursed or credited.



The recently announced grant funding from the Ministry of Children and Family Development for the creation of new licensed child care spaces is offering an opportunity. However, applying for a grant can be a daunting task the first time. To be successful the grant proposal must effectively communicate your future program. #### Through the Child's Eyes: Worry and Wonder

The prevalence of anxiety in our children has perhaps never been more prominent than it is currently. What has happened that our children are so full of worry? And what shifts need to occur for us as adults to be able to turn worry about the uncontrollable into wonder about the possibilities? As parents, teachers, and other 'big people' become increasingly concerned about their children and the functional daily impact of anxiety, our efforts can turn almost frantic as we try to glean helpful, supportive information from the unmanageable amounts available online and elsewhere. Too often this results in 'quick fix' approaches to 'solving' anxiety, rather than inviting a gentle, contemplative approach that is informed by the science of child development. This workshop will focus on making sense of the world of anxiety for children as they experience it. We will discuss the roots of anxiety and use our understanding of such to inform knowledgeable responses and supports for the children we are growing up who might be struggling with too much worry. The goal will be to provide participants with a de-

velopmentally sensitive approach to understanding worry and transforming it into wonder.

The Heart of Growing up Children: What is essential, what can go wrong, and how do we make it right? 4 week course, Thursday evenings October 2, 9, 16 & 23 • 6:30 - 9:30 pm • Cost: \$85.00 • Surrey

This 4-part series will address key concepts from the science of child development to help adults navigate the wonderfully complex journey of raising a child. Course content will be suitable for any "big person" who has an important role in the life of a child - parent, caregiver, educator, grandparent, early interventionist, etc. The course will begin with a thorough look at what is essential for healthy child development, including key concepts with respect to brain growth, as well as the role of the attachment relationship between big people and little people. We will focus on ways to best cultivate relationship and foster brain growth, and discuss challenging "bumps" in the developmental journey, including oppositionality, aggression, anxiety, and "the alpha child." We will also explore how children grow up - what nature's role is in that, and what the role of the "big people" is. Included will be a focus on how big people are needed to cultivate conditions in the child's world so that the process of development can unfold naturally and so that children can be appropriately protected from the negative impact of different things that might throw their development off course. An understanding of behavioural challenges as well as approaches to discipline will be addressed as related to the various topics being discussed throughout the course.



Inclusion is a difficult concept and an even more difficult reality. Early childhood educators and elementary teachers do struggle with "applying," "adapting," "designing" inclusion in their class-rooms. Sometime, this struggle comes from the feelings of helplessness, loneliness, and lack of

self-confidence. These feelings are fueled by the lack of time, lack of resources, and mostly... stress. What if they would let go of stress? What if inclusion could morph from a struggle into a fun, imaginative, and relaxed reality? What if educators and teachers could be given the opportunity to see the beauty of inclusion without all the clouding and interfering shadows?

This workshop will walk the participants through a multitude of practical and theoretical aspects of inclusion that will try to shift some of the usual misconceptions and fears around this complex aspect of the ECCE everyday-pedagogy. It also will focus on autism, as one of the most common realities in North America. Here are some questions we will try to answer in a practical and "loud" way:

- How can we develop an inclusive curriculum for children with ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorders) by considering their individual strengths and challenges?
- How can imaginative cognitive tools assist teachers and Special Education Assistants (EA's) to support the ongoing planning, organizing, and implementing of IEP's (Individual Education Plans) in an inclusive environment?

We will analyze IEP's in the context of inclusive classrooms and discuss how imaginative education can be implemented to support students with autism.

According to provincial child care licensing regulations, you must have completed at least 20 hours of course work in child development, guidance, health and safety, and nutrition to qualify for employment in family child care or school age child care settings as a "responsible adult." This course includes an overview of child development from birth to 12 years of age, child guidance, health and safety, nutrition and basic programming. NOTE: In order for you to receive your certificate at the end of the course, you must attend every session, hand in all assignments and quizzes and score at least 70% on each quiz.

Are you looking for a way to live with children without using scolding, time out, lectures and punishment? Do you wonder what to do when children fight over a toy, throw sand at each other or say hurtful things? This four session course will guide you to use the problem solving approach which enables children to live and work responsibly together.




