Worries and Woes: Identifying and Preventing Anxiety in Children Monday, April 7 • 6:30 - 8:30 pm • Cost: \$30.00 • Surrey

Anxiety disorders are the most common form of psychological problems reported by children, adolescents, and adults, and can interfere significantly in the lives of children. An anxiety disorder is a level of anxiety that interferes with daily functioning, either with peer relationships, academic performance, or in family routines. Children with anxiety disorders are shy, inhibited, and avoidant: families and school personnel are typically very good at identifying anxiety in children but may not use the most effective interventions to support students.

This talk will help to:

- Increase awareness of the anxiety disorder spectrum
- Understand etiological and developmental aspects of anxiety
- Identify basic behavioral indicators of anxiety in children

Presenter: Dr. Lynn Miller

Lynn D. Miller, Ph. D., R. Psych., is an Associate Professor in the Education and Counseling Psychology and Special Education department at UBC. She started her career as a classroom teacher, and then worked as a school counselor K-12. She is a consultant to the FRIENDS program, an evidence-based curriculum based on cognitive behaviour principles, targeting anxiety that is available to all grade 4-5 students in BC. She has conducted research on other models of anxiety prevention programs in schools, including Taming Worry Dragons, Skills for Social and Academic Success, Cool Little Kids, as well as an enhanced program for Aboriginal children. As the Nevison Prevention Research Professor, she is currently investigating anxiety at the entry to school in grades kindergarten and one. She is President of the Anxiety Disorders Assoc. of Canada, 2010-2014, and completed her term serving as the President of the International Association of Marriage and Family Counselors (2004-2006).



Raising Children in a Digital World

The digital world is here to stay, changing our society in a way that has far reaching consequences for our children. What are the implications for raising children? How do we harness the spectacular connecting potential and yet avoid the pitfalls of attachment technology gone awry? How do we prepare them to live in this new world and yet preserve what is required for healthy development to take place? We have followed our children into the digital world and yet for their sakes as well as ours, need to restore our lead in order to avoid the insidious dangers that live in the shadows of this potent technology. We will consider the digital revolution through the lens of developmental science, committed to helping adults help children reach their full human potential.

Dr. MacNamara is a counsellor with a private practice in Vancouver and is on faculty at the Neufeld Institute. She works with parents, educators, child-care and mental health professionals in making sense of kids from the inside out. Deborah has over 20 years experience as a counsellor and teacher working in educational and community mental health settings. She writes for a number of newsletters, parenting magazines, blogs, and is currently working on a book about young children with Dr. Neufeld at the Neufeld Institute.

Boundaries, Not Rules: Supporting & Guiding Children Through Empowerment Monday, April 14 • 6:30 - 9:00 pm • Cost: \$30.00 • Surrey

Explore positive ways to set boundaries and empower children, focusing on positive guidance strategies for supporting children with challenging behaviours. Reflect on the reasons why some children push boundaries, on the role of clear and consistent boundaries as a way to empower children, and on other positive guidance strategies. This workshop is meant to be practical, presenting "common sense" approaches based on experience working with children in a child care centre. We'll discuss the role of rewards in limiting children's potential, how to avoid power struggles, and how to listen to and respond to children respectfully.

Alpha Children: Reclaiming our Rightful Place in their Lives

Thursday evenings, 4 weeks, May 29, June 5, 12 & 19 • 6:30 - 9:00 pm Cost: \$85.00 • Surrey

A growing number of children are presenting as demanding, prescriptive, bossy and controlling. The root of the problem - the alpha dynamic - is one of the least known and yet most impactful factors in attachment. This course takes us on a fascinating journey to the essence of attachment, revealing a little-talked about dynamic that impacts every relationship, most significantly the parent-child and teacher-student relationship. We will unfold this dynamic to uncover a phenomenon even bigger than peer orientation - that our children are becoming more alpha. This alpha dynamic can manifest itself in a myriad of ways - bossiness, demanding personality, competitiveness and even bullying.

Alpha children are not only more challenging to parent but are also predisposed to a number of problems including anxiety, aggression, oppositionality, and eating problems. The plethora of advice-giving and strategies that are offered for these behaviours only tend to make matters worse when the underlying problem is an alpha complex.

In this course, Dr. MacNamara uncovers the roots of the alpha problem, and in doing so, opens the doors for lasting change: in the family, in the classroom, and in society.

This course has implications and applications for every single relationship, including marriage and friendship, and provides a unique opportunity for self-understanding. The principal focus of the course is children and the primary venues of application have to do with parenting and teaching. This course will be directly relevant to all those involved in raising

and teaching children, or supporting those who do.

In collaboration with the Children's Centre and Capilano Facilities, early childhood educators and ECCE faculty set out to investigate and implement plans for a fairy garden on the university campus.
